'Tis the season! Red and yellow, luscious and scrumptious, red and juicy, crunchy sweet apples, apples, apples!


An apple can clean your teeth after a meal. The smell of apples can help you focus when you are learning.

Apples were not native to Canada but brought into this country with French colonists who settled in the Annapolis Valley in Nova Scotia around 1633. History



"Never Ignore A Possible"

tells us that apples were growing in Central Asia thousands of years ago then migrated to many parts of the world.

Canada has its very own type of apple that began as small seedlings trying to grow in the thick bush near Dundas and Morrisburg, Ontario. There has always been a mystery as to where the seedlings came from but in the Spring of 1811, John MacIntosh with his wife Hannah Doran, discovered the little seedlings and transferred 12 to their open garden.

Only one survived the winter. When John and Hannah ate the apples that came from their brave little tree about 10 years later, they were determined to help this tart, strong, ruby red apple become an orchard that would produce more and more apples for their whole town. They faced lots of challenges to keep their orchard going but now we thank them for making the discovery of the Canadian Apple known as a 'Mac'.

Canada now sends new grafts from the MacIntosh trees to many parts of the world. We also produce more than 17 million bushels of apples from Nova Scotia, Quebec, Ontario and British Columbia every year to sell to markets in other countries. The world knows our apples as the King of Fruits. The most recent new Apple developed here in Canada is the Arctic Apple. Can you guess where it can grow?

Canada is filled with so many strong creative people who care enough to keep on trying, just like John MacIntosh and his wife, Hannah! As a Canadian, that includes you! Just like the brightly coloured, great tasting Apple that came from the little seedling growing in the bush, you can grow to face the next new challenge of the day. Full of courage and mindfulness, a little idea can become a helpful hand for a friend. When you practice your breathing or take a walk, do some reading or bake some cookies you are in charge of helping yourself to create more; to learn more. John MacIntosh saw the little seedling and knew he had the strength to help it become an apple tree that would live and grow for a hundred years!










Look at the photo. Does John and his apple tree look like they gave a lot to Canada? You know they did and they lived in Canada just like you!

## Baking with Apples

#### **Chewy Apple Oatmeal Cookies**



Directions:

1. Preheat the oven to 350 F

2. In large mixing bowl cream together butter and sugars until light and fluff

3. Beat in egg and vanilla

4. Combine flour, cinnamon, baking soda and salt

5. Gradually add to creamed mixture. Mix well.

6. Stir in oats and apples

Ingredients:

1/2 cup softened butter 1/2 cup brown sugar 1/4 cup sugar

1 egg 1/2 tsp. vanilla

3/4 cup flour
1 tsp. cinnamon
1/2 tsp. baking soda
1/8 tsp. salt

1.5 cups old-fashioned oats

1/2 cup apples chopped and floured (In Ziploc bag)

- 7. Drop by spoonfuls onto Cookie Sheet 2" apart
- 8. Bake 10-12 minutes until golden brown
- 9. Cool on wire rack

This recipe should make 2 dozen cookies. Enjoy one, and share some with your family and friends.
